

Nav Jagriti, a pioneering grassroots organization in Bihar, was established by concerned youth from Parsa block in Saran district to address flood hazards and provide citizen-centric services in North Bihar. Originating in 1991 as the "Jal Jamao Virodhee Sangharsh Committee," the group focused on flood-related issues. In 1993, it evolved into a structured organization called Nav Jagriti and was registered under the Indian Societies Registration Act. Since then, Nav Jagriti has tirelessly worked to mitigate the impact of floods and waterlogging, emerging as a leading developmental organization in Bihar.

VISION

Nav Jagriti aspires to bring the values and better living conditions for the disadvantaged and vulnerable section of the society with special focus on women and children.

MISSION

Our mission is to address the need of integrated development of child, essential livelihood options and better living conditions for women and other marginalized sections of the society especially in flood affected district of Bihar.

GOAL

To establish Local Self Governance through Sustainable Community Based Institutions.

OBJECTIVES

To eliminate poverty, social evils, exploitation, illiteracy, injustice, and superstition from society through knowledge dissemination. To establish a crime-free and just society regardless of class, caste, and greed. To establish a self-reliant and sustainable society through employment generation programs, intervention adoption, climate change mitigation, multidimensional livelihood approaches and women-led initiatives for the community's benefit. To address downtrodden communities including SC, ST, backward, minority, and unreached sections through the promotion of education, health, nutrition initiatives and alternative livelihood options. To address human rights, right to food, child entitlements and child marriages. To restore/appropriately use water resources and manage them through water harvesting for irrigation purposes. To promote skill enhancement/training and capacity-building processes on various thematic issues for better livelihood and sustainability. To promote natural resources through waste management and adoption of green energy to reduce CO2 emissions in the environment. To address disaster response and relief interventions through disaster risk reduction initiatives during and after floods, along with other natural calamities in Bihar.

1991: In 1991 the youth of Parsa Block had started an informal organization "Jal Jamao Virodhee Sangharsh Committee". Initially the committee was dedicatedly highlighting and raising the issues related to flood and its disaster on different platforms.

1993: The informal group "Jal Jamao Virodhee Sangharsh Committee" got registered as formal organization under society registration act, 1860.

1998: Nav Jagriti crosses a long pathway to manage flood disasters, women empowerment, gender main streaming and ensuring child rights.

2000: Nav Jagriti realizing the growing problems of the untouchable communities addressed the issue of poverty among most vulnerable untouchable communities in 9 districts of Bihar.

2003: Worked on key thematic issues like Gender, Human Rights, Disaster Risk Reduction, Child Rights, Health and Livelihood etc.

2004: Nav Jagriti dedicated in staff capacity building and welfare. It has gathered a team of committed professionals to lead the march of the vision and goal of Nav Jagriti.

2005: This year Nav Jagriti entered in health sector and constructed a hospital in Parsa, Saran with the name Nav Jagriti Sewa Sadan.

2006: The issues like HIV/AIDS, safe delivery mechanism, benefits of National Rural Health Mission Program etc. Were focused.

2007: Alternative Energy (Solar Application) and Alternative livelihood through Sustainable Land Management Practices for Mushahar community in North Bihar were one of the most successful interventions of the year.

2008: This year Bihar was severely affected by flood due to breach in Koshi Embankment at Kusaha and flood has affected 2.3 million people in North Bihar. Nav Jagriti emerged as a organization which provided humanitarian support in Khagaria, Sitamarhi, Samastipur, Supaul, Katihar and other district. This was the year when Nav Jagriti mobilized huge funding and reached out to communities with relief work the same year Nav Jagriti constructed five flood centers in Khagaria, and Samastipur with the support of Save the Children.

2009: Nav Jagriti responded to long term recovery process for flood effected families in some flood effected areas of Bihar.

2010: Initiated "Tara Akshar" program with women SHG Members, convergence with Govt. in providing school uniform and bicycle to promote girl education, NFE programme of Govt. of India.

2011: 700 SHGs formed, Total savings mobilized Rs. 60,00,000, total loans availed by the groups from banks Rs. 14,00,000. Recovery rate of Bank was 70-80%.

2012: Initiated School integration program under "Support My School Project", Constructed 9 schools for Mushahar Community in Saran and Sitamarhi Districts of Bihar, Implementation started on child centered DRR in Khagaria, Saran and Sitamarhi districts of Bihar.

2013: Nav Jagriti undertaken the initiatives developing climate change and city resilience strategy, started Bihar's first Rehabilitation Home for male Beggars, The same year we started CMDRR Programme in Sitamarhi District, Bihar.

2014: Nav Jagriti entered in its urban Slum Initiative on issue of WASH, Flood early warning system.

2015: This year Nav Jagriti started working in integrated approach and started the project to build the resilience of children and communities by integrating the DRR, social protection and technology in 25 villages of Khagaria district, Bihar.

2016: Started working on microfinance in Sitamarhi district. This program was started with the support of Rang De to empower the women of marginalized communities through developing them as entrepreneur.

2017: Nav Jagriti started working on Agriculture with Aga Khan Foundation and implementing pulse development program.

2018: Started a project in Saran district with the support of Kindernoethilfe, Germany on Child Rights and Child Protection.

2019: Started a project with the support of Kinderpostzegels (SKN), Netherlands in Muzafferpur and Khagaria districts. The title is the project is "WORKS: NO CHILD BUSINESS" aimed at protection of child and safeguarding their interest.

2020: Started a project with the support of donor agencies known as "Association for Stimulating Know-How", New Delhi in Siwan district of Bihar. The project is aimed at facilitating formal migration to Gulf Countries without exploitation.

2021: Nav Jagriti focused on Integrated Rural Development project. The projects were focused on human resources development with integral approaches such as community building, group farming, promotion of solar energy and group enterprise for sustainable livelihood in Gaya District.

2022: Integrated Child development projects were focused in especially for reduce dropout, out of school children, child marriage, child labour, child rights and entitlement and children were reintegrated formal schooling system, promotion of vocational training i.e. Computer literacy training, Tailoring/sewing training for adolescent girls for their sustainable livelihood in Saran, Khagaria, districts of Bihar.

2023: The projects were focused CBOs capacity building process to catalyst role of women as leadership to address social development issues along with reduce gender discrimination and social justices. Women empowered in decision making process through active involvement in all social and development issues at family and community levels.

Core Values: Nav Jagriti is dedicated to values that have been carefully cultivated over time. These values serve as guiding principles for strengthening unity among voluntary organisations in India and form the foundation of Nav Jagriti's programs, activities, and relationships with member organisations and all stakeholders.

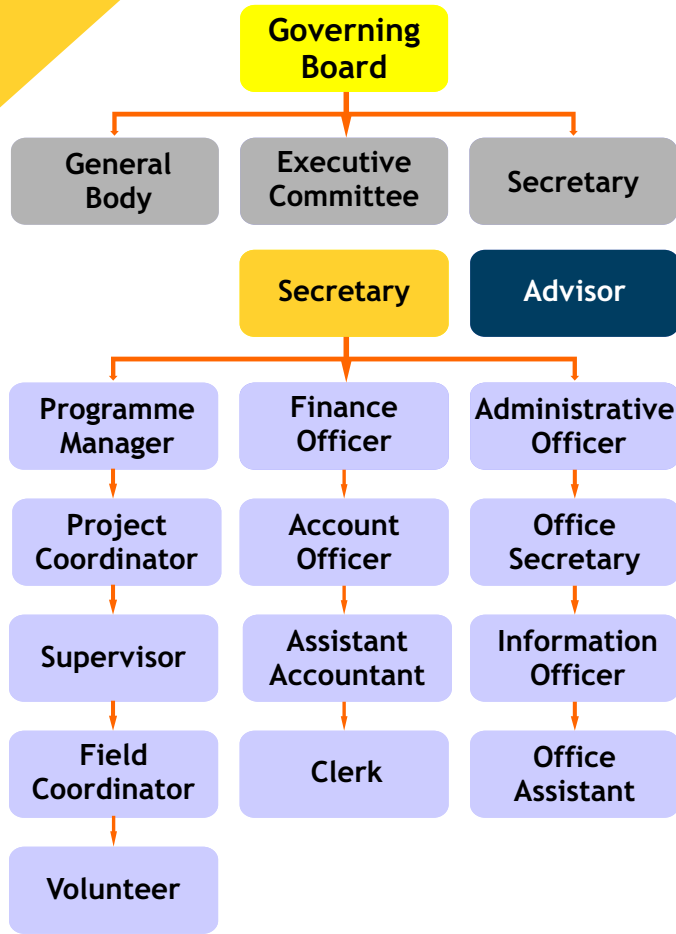

Manju Devi is well known personality in the North Bihar, She had a strong struggle and impactful work addressing the issues of fatal flood and water logging on the agricultural land in Saran and Sitamarhi district of Bihar. She had led the movement "Jal jamao virodhee sangharsh samiti" started by youth of Parsa block in Saran district. Being a women she understood the problem villagers especially women and children and always raised their issues on different platforms. She is also the president of Nav Jagriti.

Mr. Jitendra Kumar (Secretary)

Jitendra Kumar is the secretary of Nav Jagriti, In his initial days he was associated with Nav Bharat Jagriti Kendra, Hazaribagh (Jharkhand). During his work realized the hardship life of people, who are trapped in vicious circle of poverty and he decided to come back to his native place laid the foundation of Nav Jagriti in 1993. Saran district had water logging problem as approx. 60% of total cultivable land was submerged in water, which jeopardize the means of livelihood of the people based on agriculture and allied activities.

NJ started working on the issues of water logging and motivated people for drainage the canals to remove the water from the sub-merged land and reclaimed the land for agriculture purpose. He promoted the revival of agriculture for local economic development to enhance the agriculture production to meet out the physiological need of people. Later on realized multi-dimensional problems of the people like health, education, gender, flood preparedness & mitigation and children issues and started working on these issues with the help of National and International donors.

Mr. Prabhat Kumar (Treasurer)

Prabhat Kumar is an Accounts Professional. He has 5 years plus experience in finance sector. He has worked with many NGOs and INGOs. As the Treasurer of our NGO, Prabhat Kumar plays a crucial role in managing the financial health and integrity of our organization. Dr. Dinesh Kumar Mishra

Dr. Dinesh Kumar Mishra graduated in civil engineering from IIT Kharagpur, He also holds P.hd from South Gujarat University. He is one of the renowned water activist in India, has been working since 1987 in North Bihar. He has published around one hundred books on the issues of water, dam and embankments. He is also the convener of Barh Mukti Abhiyan which was established in 1991 with a view to initiate the flood debate amongst the politicians, bureaucrats, engineers, concerned citizen and common man together with initiating people's movement against technical fallacies. Dr. Mishra has launched the movement that empowers citizen group to re-establish their cultural ownership over rivers and create a new paradigm of flood control, non-confrontational tools that respect the natural cycle of floods and responds with minimum technological interference. He has organized public debates in more than 500 villages in the most flooded part of North Bihar. Dr. Dinesh Kumar Mishra has been associated with Nav Jagriti since its inception and providing his valuable mentorship to Nav Jagriti as well as co-opting several government departments, engineers, politicians and policy makers.

Ms. Nibha Sinha

Nibha Sinha is a freelance faculty (Journalism and Mass communication) and an independent researcher and journalist. She has M.phil in Journalism from IIMC, New Delhi. She has also PG diploma in Human Rights. Since Long time, she has been doing journalism on Education, Traditional, and Digital Media, Development communication (Sustainable development, Agriculture and women health very actively. She has a worked with various reputed magazines and media house like Dainik Jagran (Noida), Desh Lokhit (Hindi) magazine, federation of Indian chambers of commerce and Industry (FICCI, Delhi) Centre for the Studies of Developing Societies (CSDS, Delhi), Centre for Civil Society (CCS, NGO, New Delhi), High Way Samachar (Newspaper For Truck Drivers) as Journalists, Researcher and Content Developer. 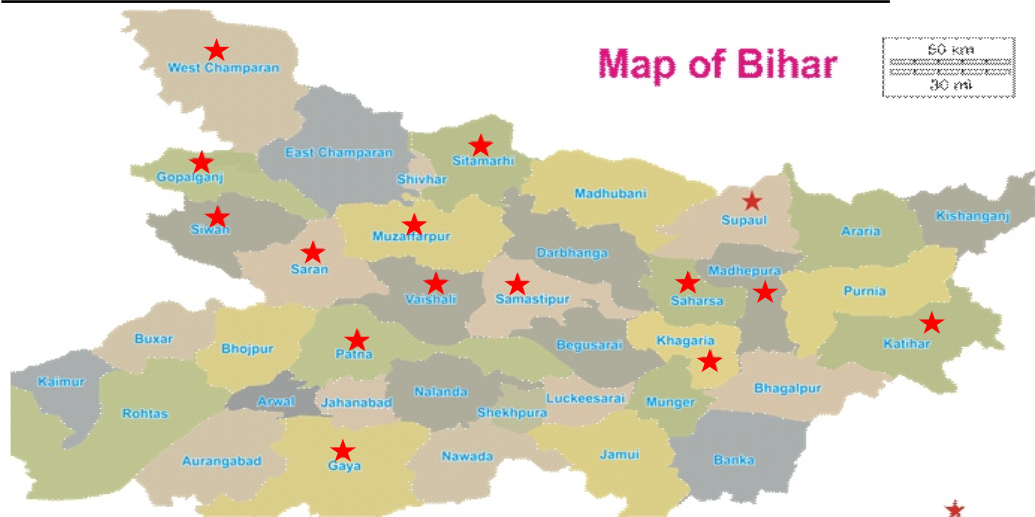

NAV JAGRITI A LOOK BACK

The past year has been an extraordinary journey for Nav Jagriti, marked by resilience, innovation, and an unwavering commitment to uplift marginalized communities across our operational geographies. Our multi-thematic interventions have created lasting impacts, empowering individuals, strengthening communities, and paving the way for sustainable development.

Navigating through the challenges posed by natural calamities, we remained at the forefront, providing immediate relief and fortifying community resilience. Our timely interventions during disasters ensured the distribution of essential food materials to 1,412 affected individuals across 49 villages, alleviating their immediate distress. Additionally, we provided hygiene kits and educational support to 690 individuals in 27 villages, prioritizing their well-being and ensuring continuity of education.



Recognizing the importance of preventive healthcare, we organized 35 health camps, benefitting 2,599 individuals and addressing their urgent medical needs. Simultaneously, we conducted awareness campaigns across operational districts, equipping communities with knowledge and skills to better prepare for and mitigate the impacts of future disasters.



Acknowledging the intrinsic link between human well-being and the health of our natural environment, we implemented initiatives to promote sustainable natural resource management. Our efforts included undertaking plantation drives, where we planted 1,200 fruit trees across half an acre of land, contributing to greener landscapes and food security. Furthermore, we distributed 650 solar lamps to adolescent girls and boys, and installed 95 solar street lights, promoting clean energy solutions and reducing our carbon footprint. In 62 villages, we facilitated the adoption of high-yielding vegetable seeds, enhancing agricultural productivity and ensuring nutritional security for rural households.

Recognizing the transformative power of sustainable livelihoods, we implemented a range of initiatives to enhance economic opportunities and foster self-reliance among communities. In the agricultural sector, we promoted the cultivation of pulses using high-yielding varieties in 15 villages, linking farmers to Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) for better market access. Additionally, we facilitated the adoption of improved agricultural practices, such as goateries and poultry rearing, involving 480 individuals. Our efforts extended to non-farm livelihoods as well, where we supported the establishment of 42 individual enterprises in Saran and Gaya districts, providing a pathway to economic independence.

We arranged more than 200 health camps, helping a remarkable 22,000 people, since we recognized the vital role that healthcare plays in community development. In order to guarantee prompt access to healthcare, these camps offered tests, referrals, and vital medical services. Furthermore, we built 45 soak pits and 190 family latrines as part of our sanitation and hygiene priorities, which helped to enhance health outcomes and reduce water-borne illnesses. Additionally, we made it easier for communities to access public health systems by sending 5,000 cases to district hospitals and Primary Health Centers (PHCs), guaranteeing all-encompassing healthcare support.



We put in place a thorough program for managing plastic trash because we realized how urgently sustainable waste management techniques were needed. As part of our initiatives, we educated 2,945 people on the value of Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs) and the management of plastic waste in the Samastipur district. 344 people were trained in efficient waste management methods, and 50 media representatives were made aware of the MRF model's transformative potential. By working together, we were able to gather an amazing 4,495 kg of plastic waste, halting environmental damage and advancing the circular economy. In addition, we organized awareness campaigns, interacting with 8,000 schoolchildren and establishing ten Self-Help Groups (SHGs) led by women to promote this cause.





We launched a number of programs to guarantee that kids have access to high-quality learning opportunities as we understood how important education is in determining one's future. We created 30 non-formal education centers to give dropout and after-school students a comfortable place to learn. In order to provide a network of protection for children's rights and welfare, we also established 43 village-level child protection committees. We also set up computer skill centers in five communities, which benefited ninety kids, as part of our efforts to improve digital literacy. We successfully enrolled 500 kids in government schools through our combined efforts, opening doors for their future chances and overall development.

Providing people with the necessary skills is a fundamental component of our sustainable development strategy. Our initiatives for skill development and vocational training have changed lives and opened doors to new economic prospects for communities. 2,100 farmers received training from us on improving

their vegetable farming, which raised their earnings and productivity. Furthermore, we introduced kitchen gardening to 1,350 members of Self-Help Groups (SHGs), fostering nutritional security and additional revenue production. In order to provide food security and better lives, we trained 2,020 farmers in the agricultural sector in the cultivation of pulses, paddy, and wheat. In addition, we made solar group irrigation systems accessible, helping 500 farmers on 175 acres of land. 450 farmers were benefited by our farm field activities, which included capacity building and training, empowering them to implement sustainable agricultural methods.



Driven by the belief that every individual deserves dignity and a chance at a better life, we implemented a comprehensive beggar rehabilitation program. Through our efforts, we successfully reunited 830 individuals with their families, fostering social reintegration and restoring familial bonds. Moreover, we enrolled 1,179 beneficiaries, including elderly

Individuals and beggars, at our Sewa Kutir shelter homes, providing them with a safe haven and access to essential services. Recognizing the importance of economic empowerment, we provided vocational training and facilitated employment opportunities for 137 individuals, enabling them to embark on a path of self-sufficiency and self-reliance.



Our flagship HDFC Bank CSR project in Gaya district exemplified our commitment to holistic and integrated development. This comprehensive initiative impacted 5,068 farmers, equipping them with knowledge, resources, and support to enhance their livelihoods. We established a robust ecosystem for community empowerment by creating 95 community institutions, including Village Development Committees (VDCs), adolescent groups, farmer clubs, beekeeping enterprises, school management committees, and child parliaments. These institutions played a pivotal role in driving localized development initiatives. In the Belaganj Block of Gaya District, we erected seven solar-powered irrigation

systems, benefiting 420 farmers and spanning 175 acres of land in order to fulfill the urgent demand for sustainable agriculture. To further improve neighborhood safety and promote clean energy alternatives, we also placed 95 solar street lamps.

Eight Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) centers were renovated and made more aesthetically pleasing, and seven smart schools were established as part of a continued emphasis on education. Children's overall development was fostered by these measures that provided favorable learning environments.

We held 60 health camps, reaching out to 7,000 beneficiaries, realizing the unbreakable connection between health and general well-being. Through early diagnosis, access to healthcare, and good hygiene, these camps ensured prompt interventions and preventive measures.

As we reflect on the past year, Nav Jagriti remains steadfast in its commitment to empowering communities, fostering resilience, and driving sustainable development. Our integrated approach, rooted in community participation and ownership, has catalyzed transformative change, addressing the multifaceted challenges faced by marginalized populations. We remain dedicated to building upon our successes, continuously adapting to evolving needs, and forging new pathways towards a more equitable and prosperous future for all.

OUR APPROACHES

Nav Jagriti adopts an integrated and participatory approach to drive holistic development in the communities it serves. Our key approaches are:

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY INSTITUTIONS:

We firmly believe that sustainable development must be owned and driven by the communities themselves. Hence, we prioritize strengthening and empowering grassroots institutions like Self-Help Groups (SHGs), Farmer Clubs, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs). We build their capacities through training, handholding support, and facilitating access to resources, markets and government schemes. These institutions then spearhead development actions in their respective areas.



COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION AND CAPACITY BUILDING:



At the core of our work is mobilizing communities, enhancing their awareness on key issues, and building their skills and knowledge through capacity building initiatives. We engage communities right from the planning stage to instill a sense of ownership. A range of capacity building programs are conducted covering domains like sustainable agriculture, alternative livelihoods, leadership, rights and entitlements.

QUALITY EDUCATION THROUGH BRIDGE COURSE CENTRES:

Ensuring access to quality education for all children is a key priority. We run Bridge Course Centres that provide remedial and alternative education to out-of-school and dropout children, helping them get Main Streamed into the formal education system. Adopting an activity-based curriculum, these centres create a joyful learning environment.



CHILD-CENTRED PROGRAMMING:

Our interventions place children at the centre, focusing on ensuring their rights to survival, development, protection and participation. We sensitize and build capacities of communities on child protection issues. Child-friendly platforms like Children's Parliaments are created for children to voice their concerns.



SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS & AGRICULTURE:

We promote sustainable livelihood opportunities through enhancing skills, facilitating access to resources and linking to markets. For the agriculture-dependent communities, we provide training on sustainable agriculture techniques, create farmer producer groups, and forge market linkages. Non-farm livelihoods like stitching, beekeeping etc. are also promoted.



ENGAGING WITH GOVERNANCE SYSTEMS:

We actively engage and collaborate with elected panchayat representatives, government officials and policy makers. This includes capacity building programs, sharing field insights to influence policy decisions, and campaigning for effective implementation of govt. Schemes/programs.



CONVERGENCE WITH GOVERNMENT AND OTHER AGENCIES:

We leverage convergence opportunities with relevant government departments and other development agencies operating in our areas. This convergence approach enhances reach, impact and optimum utilization of resources.



1. DISASTER RISK REDUCTION & CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION:

Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and climate change adaptation (CCA) are inter connected approaches aimed at minimizing the adverse impacts of natural hazards and climate change on communities, economies, and ecosystems. Both fields emphasize the importance of proactive planning, community engagement, and sustainable practices to build resilience. Assessing the likelihood and potential impact of these hazards on communities. Evaluating the vulnerability of people, infrastructure, and ecosystems to hazards. Assessing the capacity of communities to cope with and recover from disasters. As result of continuous capacity building to face disaster situations, people of flood affected districts of Bihar are enabled to address the disaster issues.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✦ Distribution of food Materials to the affected Areas covered 49 villages 1412 individuals.
- ✦ Distributions of Hygiene Kits and educational materials Kits in Saran and Muzaffarpur districts covered 27 Villages and 690 individuals.
- ✦ Organized Health Camps at Saran, Gaya and Muzaffarpur districts covered 35 villages and 2599 individuals were benefitted.
- ✦ Awareness Campaigns were organized at all operational districts



2. KINDER NOTE HILFE (KNH)

PROJECT TITLE: NAYI ZINDGI

Project Objective: To gain an in-depth understanding of the nature and scope of the child labour and child trafficking and reduce it through community awareness and enforcement of child rights and protection laws and regulations.

Direct target groups: 10358

Indirect Target Groups: 78523

We have been focusing community led institution's interventions and identify community leaders for enhancing their capacity on child rights issues to address child abuse, child labour and child trafficking in our target areas. We are strengthening child protection systems for reduce child labour and child trafficking. We are ensuring community institutions and adolescent participation and their engagement towards the child rights issues. Indirect stakeholders are playing catalyst role for generating awareness building process,

Enhancing knowledge and capacity

on child issues and relevant laws and its provisions for nurturing action against child abuse and their rights. We also access the internal monitoring mechanism to execute programmes and activities by our capable staffs and potential leadership we are confident to implement project successfully and achieve targets within stipulated time frame. We also address child related issues within our operational blocks and villages with the close support of community institutions and government agencies and CBOs networks. We are also focusing direct and indirect stakeholders to strengthen project objectives and scaling up for replication in other areas. Achievements of the project:

KEY HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✍ 180 children will be mainstreamed to get in formal education system.
- ✍ 1222 children will receive formal education and develop learning skills and continue their education.
- ✍ 77 youths will receive vocational skill training and get engage sustainable livelihood.
- ✍ 20 Child Protection Committees were formed at all operational villages.
- ✍ 385 Child Protection Committees members playing catalyst role to protect child rights and their entitlements.
- ✍ 25 SHGs formed and strengthening in all operational villages.
- ✍ 57 girls have enrolled to stitching/ tailoring vocational course.

- ✍ 20 youths have enrolled in bamboo basket/ vocational skill training.
- ✍ 90 students were received computer training vocational course for their sustainability.



3. HDFC Bank Ltd.

On the basis of that NJ has been implemented HDFC Bank CSR initiatives a "Holistic Rural Development Programme (HRDP)" flagship programme in 15 villages of Belaganj block of Gaya District, Bihar since 2021. The holistic approach supports the lives of communities by providing necessary inputs on issues like shaping economic independence through skilling, providing basic infrastructural and establishing a better ecosystem thereby promoting better living conditions.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS OF HDFC BANK LTD. SUPPORTED PROJECT-GAYA

- ✂ 1710 farmers benefitted (Promotion of Pulse crop, Vegetable Cultivation, Paddy & Wheat).

4. SKN - NETHERLAND

Project Objective: To reduce child labor by access basic and quality education through bridging course especially focused deprive and underprivileged communities.

Operational Areas: 30 Villages in two blocks in two districts.

Nav Jagriti has been implementing the project in 30 villages of two different blocks Mansi and Aurai in khagaria and Muzaffarpur districts respectively to reduce child labor and enrolled in formal schooling system since long period of time. Our initiatives has been impactful in protecting children from child labor by engaging community led institutions, direct and indirect community stakeholders, elected representatives at panchayat level and NGOs network those are involved in child rights and their entitlements.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✍ 06 NFE centers (bridge course) are running in 06 villages.
- ✍ 95 children are enrolled in formal school.
- ✍ 37 child labor are re enrolled in formal school.
- ✍ 30 adolescent groups are established and strengthen and capacitate on child rights and their entitlements.
- ✍ 283 adolescent's members (Boys & Girls) play catalyst role towards child rights.

- ✍ 179 girls/women are trained/ capacitated on Gender discrimination and justice.
- ✍ Two exposure visits have been organized of the project staff among the WNCB Partners, which are working on child labor.



5. CENTRE FOR ENVIRONMENT EDUCATION

PROJECT TITLE: Rural & Urban Landscape Free of Dry & Plastic Waste.

Project Objective: Project aim to promote an integrated, interdisciplinary multifaceted, dry waste and plastic recovery and recycling centers as SWACHH CENTRES wherein recovery recycling and product making are intertwined in one place within adequate distance to ensure low transportation costs, safety standards product efficiency and better productivity during implementation. In addition the project focused on 'segregation at the sources' as once the waste is mixed then it cannot be fixed. Sensitizing all citizens for ownership, to segregate at home, workplace and institutions for a low carbon economy / lifestyle. For waste segregated at source is a resources.

Recyclables will be segregated through semi-automatic processes at SWACHH CENTRES, which will provide greater livelihood to marginalized informal waste pickers and small aggregators and reduce landfills/dumping site.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✎ 2945 individual aware under MRF/PWM project in Samastipur district.
- ✎ 11529 individual sensitized and capacitated through capacity building Training.
- ✎ 344 individuals trained on plastic waste management.
- ✎ 50 media representatives were made aware/ sensitized towards Plastic Waste Management System and addressed transformative model of Material Recovery Facility.
- ✎ 4495 KGs total plastic collected.
- ✎ 8000 school students sensitized.
- ✎ 768 door to door awareness campaigns conducted.



- ✎ 10 women led SHGs groups formed and strengthen.
- ✎ 456 individual aware and access health services during Health Awareness camps.
- ✎ 2756 MT of CO2 carbon emission checked till date.



6. STATE SOCIETY FOR ULTRA POOR AND SOCIAL WELFARE (SSUPSW)

PROJECT TITLE: Mukhyamantri Bhikshavriti Niwaran Yojana

Project Objective: The Bihar government has started a project called "Mukhya Mantri Bhikshavriti Niwaran Yojna (MBNY)", with a vision to protect and promote the rights of homeless beggars by ensuring their care, protection, development, socio- economic and cultural empowerment through enabling policies and programmes. This programme is also known as "Pehchan". The Government of Bihar has established "SAKSHAM" (State Society for Ultra Poor and Social Welfare) within the Social Welfare Department to work on the issues of people into beggary.

Apart from the implementation of other projects, the Society is fully accountable for the implementation of MBNY, the scheme to eradicate homeless beggary from the State. Homeless Beggars” in Patna city from 2013 onwards. The project covers persons engaged in the act of begging to provide identification, rehabilitation, provision of medical facilities, counseling, education, and skill development. This includes the approach of providing shelter home, emergency medical care and treatment, counseling, care and treatment to beggars with mental health issues to recover and re-enter stable housing and community living arrangements where they may pursue fulfilling lives.



KEY HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✦ 830 inmates (Beggars) reunited within families.
- ✦ SAKSHAM-in Sewa Kutir 1179 beneficiaries (elderly PwD, Beggars) enrolled from Patna.
- ✦ 137 inmates have been trained and linked with various jobs & employments.



7. SEWA SADAN

PROJECT TITLE:

Improve Community health services by curative and preventive health care initiatives in flood and water logged areas of Parsa Block of Saran District in Bihar.

Project Objective: Nav Jagriti has been implementing in Parsa Block with the support of MISEREOR-Germany by establishing Hospital for needy people called "SEWA SADAN" for immediate health care services of needy people i.e. downtrodden and underprivileged communities. This project also addressed menstrual health, hygiene and sanitation and adoption of multi types of contraceptives through health awareness campaign and provide health care services. The project also addressed curatives and preventives aspects of the diseases especially for water borne communicable & non-communicable diseases, diarrhea, cold and cough along with Mother's and child health for target communities.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✎ Rapport building on health care services.
- ✎ Health camps for downtrodden and unprivileged communities are focused.
- ✎ Provide health care services and support as well as referral services to PHCs and sadar hospitals.
- ✎ Screening and diagnose diseases earlier to take curatives measure.
- ✎ Awareness building on health related issues focus on preventive measure.
- ✎ Dissemination information on health issues through IEC activities.



The project was high profile initiatives with the support of Patna Urban Local Body patna (Patna municipal corporation). Nav Jagriti has previously engaged in Plastic Waste Management programme in Samastipur district of Bihar with the support of Centre for Environment Education (CEE) New Delhi since last 4 Years.

KEY INTERVENTIONS:

- ✎ NJ provide technical support to established MRF center at Danapur-Patna
- ✎ Liaison and an advocacy with urban local Body Danapur to established MRF center
- ✎ NJ provide technical support to mobilize rag pikers and communities towards the livelihood initiatives through awareness building process.
- ✎ Provide alternatives use of plastic waste materials through various activities by involving target community and enforcement agencies.
- ✎ Provide technical support to collect plastic waste materials and proper recycling process.

8. AGA KHAN FOUNDATION

PROJECT TITLE:

Consultation Role on MRF Centre

Nav Jagriti played a role being Consultant in the field of Material Recovery Facilitation (MRF) Center which was set up by **AGA KHAN FOUNDATION** at Danapur ULB Patna.

Nav Jagriti provides technical, managerial and handholding support to run the MRF center efficiently for the further period of 10th November 2023. This was the great experience to the project team and AKF officials.



SUCCESS STORIES

1. "Child Labour is a crime never give up if parents are not initiated towards literacy".

Mr. Abhishek Kumar 12 year's old and second child of Mr. Naresh Manjhi lived in Pachrukhi of Parsa Block of saran District Bihar. The family is very poor survive on as daily labours since long time or you say economically poor since inception.

Nav Jagriti started the project "Nai Jindagi" in Saran District, Mr. Abhishek Kumar's parents are daily wage labourers. Their family income is very less to feed the family as well as never care to provide school for the educational needs of other children. Abhishek Kumar is a very bright student he left in 3 standard due to earning support to the family and fell down as a child labour to start work in Brick kiln and could not attend school regularly. "I had got admission in class 4 in government school, teachers appreciated my performance in the class. But I could not go to school regularly due to family burden for their livelihood. My father always worry about my education but lack of resource he could not support, now at present I am happy to attend school regularly". Nav Jagriti, always started work to reduce child labour from the target areas. The NJ representatives find out the real cause of the Mr. Abhishek kumar and convinced the parents for Abhishek's education in continue and enrolled his name in SPK center. His father's commit to regularize his education is not discontinue at all cost and support NJ representatives to reduce child labour drive in target area. Abhishek's mother is also involved in SHG so that SHGs members support to Abhishek schooling in regular basis and monitor to access the school in punctual. SPK teacher's remakes is so good towards his progress, family happy to see the progress and commit both (Mother and father) to ensure regular attendance in school without fail. Presently Mr. Abhishek Kumar admitted in 4 standard in formal school and do better with the support of family members and NJ representatives both are the key mobilizer and care givers for assistance school attendance and his progress. This is the way forward for other children so that numbers of children mobilize to enroll in SPKs centers in very short period of time.





2. "From seeds of struggle, she grew a harvest of hope."

Punam is a small marginalized farmer; she was struggling with her day to life for survival with small piece of land that had been in her family for generations. Her husband is daily wage labor, she is mother of three growing children, and she is blessed with two daughters and a son. It was always been struggle for Punam and her family to meet the basic needs of life,

Especially arrange nutritious and health food for children, Provide quality of education to the children, get the good health services with the limited earning of the family. Punam was passionate about agriculture and saw it not just as a means of survival but also as a way to contribute to her family. She was inclined towards vegetables farming. However, life was not easy for her. As a female farmer, one of the major problems was the lack of access to knowledge of modern farming tools and technology and organic farming. Moreover, the limited access to credit and financial resources was also the major challenges for Punam and her family. NAV JAGRITI, with support of HDFC Bank, under Holistic Rural Development Project (HRDP) was implementing project in the village, the project focuses on empowering rural women. During the meetings, Punam's potential and the struggles she endured was recognized by the project team. She is one of the active members of KVS group, she showed her interest in organic vegetable farming. Her economic and social condition made her enlisted in among beneficiaries list in the project. The project team did comprehensive situation analysis of Punam family, and also assist her skill and knowledge which can be suitable for supporting her in livelihood. She was farmer was well equipped with knowledge of growing vegetables, but did not have understanding of new technique of vegetable farming and organic farming, hence NAV Jagariti, organization provided her with training, access to modern farming technologies, and financial assistance. This support transformed Punam's farm, significantly increasing her organic vegetable grow and income. With time, Punam's became a role model for other female farmers in the village. She shared her knowledge and experiences, inspiring a wave of change in the community's perception of women in agriculture. The once marginalized female farmers started gaining recognition for their vital role in sustainable farming practices. Punam's story became a beacon of hope for many, illustrating that with the right support and opportunities, even the most disadvantaged farmers could overcome obstacles and contribute significantly to the well-being of their families and communities.

3. "Education is the bridge from poverty to possibility."

Chaidha village is located 15 Km away from the Khagaria district headquarters and most of the poor people are living in the village due to recurrence flood brings by the Ganga and allied rivers every year. Mr. Bipin Singh & his wife Ms. Nootan Devi is residence of Chaidha village and having a son Mr. Aayush Kumar, age-8 years.

Mr. Bipin Singh is landless and lives in town areas to earn bread of their family members. Mr. Aayush was not going to schools due to perception in the mind of Ms. Nootan Devi that we are born in poor, live in poor and die in poor and there is no benefit for people of education. With the support of "Work No: Child Business" project, we are organizing meeting with the community people and training on various aspect. The mother of Mr. Aayush Kumar participated in the training program on "Right of Education" organized by the Nav Jagriti and after that her perception was changed that education is important tools to make children life. She suddenly approached to Mr. Mritunjai Kumar, Field Level Workers and said that she wants to enroll her children in the Government Schools to get the education. With the help of Field Level Workers, Mr. Aayush Kumar admission was done in Class-II in Primary School Chaida. Right now, he is going to school on a regular way and her mother supporting to send the school every day.
