



#1. Mukhay Mantri Biksha Vriti Niwaran Yojna

PROJECT LOCATION: PATNA

DONORS: GOVERNMENT OF BIHAR

OUR OBJECTIVES:

Mukhay Mantri Viksha Vriti Niwaran Yojna (SAKSHAM) is a society led by the Bihar Government's Department of Social Welfare to protect and promote the rights of the poor and beggars by ensuring their care, protection, development, socio-economic and cultural empowerment through enabling policies and programmes.

KEY ACTIVITES:

- · Giving Support to Beggars:
- Shelter: The beneficiary is provided with a safe place to stay in the shelter house.
- Food & Water: The beneficiary receives a sanitary meal three times a day, as well as clean drinking water.
- Toilet and bathroom facilities: The beneficiary is provided with a well-equipped toilet and bathroom facility.
- Bedding: The beneficiary is furnished with a nice quality mattress on which to rest and sleep.





- **Medical facility:** When these beneficiaries become unwell as a result of their poor health, ANM transports them to the hospital for treatment.
- Those who receive assistance begin each day by praying. Additionally, they only participate in indoor games. Beneficiaries manufactured the paper folders, and they did other labour as well, according to their own preferences.

We're teaching them how to write and make paper folders so they won't have to resort to smuggling to get by. We also established contacts with small businesses and people who make a living from home. Nearly fifty benefactors have been found to be connected to the five of yours. In the past year, four recipients have been hired on as employees at Sewa Kutir.

Farmers became sensitized on the use of Organic compost in their fields and avoid the fertilizers in order to prevent the land being barren.


Economic empowerment increases women's agency access to formal government programs, mobility outside the home, economic independence, and purchasing power. Policy makers are suggested to support job training to aid in entrance in the formal markets.

NJ-CASA provided total assistance of -12 Vermi pits in our intervention region, while the community constructed 43 new ones. This is a success. There is a vermin compost pit for household gardening, paddy, and maize. Composting of vermin helps the environment.

Farmers must employ soil testing for the greatest results in agriculture. Farmers can learn about the soil type and how many elements are present in the soil by conducting a soil test. It will be prepared and the soil producing capacity will be boosted.

#3 Nayi Zindgi (New Life)

PROJECT LOCATION: Saran (Chapra) District of Bihar

DONORS : Kindernothilfe (KNH)

OUR OBJECTIVES:

• Developments in environment and external conditions with implications on the project.

• To abolish child labor trafficking, prostitution and ensuring the safeguard to the children.

- To increase the awareness among the children (affected as well as non-affected) by engaging there through direct participation in the activities.
- To create informal centres of education that will impart non-formal education to children as well as encourage them to join the formal education.

To increase the employability of the youth by imparting vocational skills.

- * To ensure economic empowerment of women through formation of self-help groups (SHGs) and sensitizing there on child rights and development issues.
- * To engage stakeholders in the civil society and government institution for effective implementation of the child protection law.

KEY ACTIVITIES:


- To effect positive improvements in children's educational levels by raising awareness of child rights and regulations relating to child development, as well as assisting in the prevention of child labour, child marriage, and other atrocities against children.
- Each of the ten project villages has organised a child protection committee (CPC) with at least 15 members to provide training on child rights and child protection problems.
- Two two-day centralised residential training programmes with 30 members of the CPC each were organised with members of the child club, ward members as PRI, ASHA, Sevika from ICDS, Teacher from Govt. School, and Sensitive residents of the village.
- In each village, a kid club of 15 youngsters has been founded. The monthly meetings of kid clubs are held on a regular basis to discuss topics and raise awareness about child issues and solutions.
- · Establishment of 10 NFE centres.
- · Mainstreaming the children into formal education system.
- One day non-residential training on Right to Education (RTE).

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- As a result of improved stakeholder knowledge, people have been able to end malpractices and mistreatment of children. Child labour, child marriage, and human trafficking have all decreased dramatically.
- 25 staff members are equipped with intervention tools and information in the areas of child rights and protection (trafficking, child labour, and child abuse), which they can put to use in a variety of activities to fulfil project objectives.

- 150 children are aware on child rights as well as act on imparted trainings to avoid themselves from abuse and report in time to parents and other stakeholders.
- 10 committees for child protection are effectively working and doing their duties in accordance with the committee's norms and regulations.
- Ten NFE centres have now been created in ten project villages, with drop-out children and school-aged children enrolling in each of the NFE centres. The following are the details of the enrolled youngsters as reported by the NFE centres:

#4 Indian Grain Legume Cluster Development

PROJECT LOCATION: Saran and Siwan

DONORS : Aga Khan Foundation

Bill and Melinda Gates

Foundation (BMGF)



OUR OBJECTIVES:

- Working with 4000 small farmers in Saran's Manjhi and Rivilganj Blocks, as well as Siwan's Siswan and Raghunathpur Blocks, to develop and execute a package of better pulse cultivation practises.
- Strengthening the pulses value chain by demonstrating an efficient and successful pulse farming strategy in Bihar, with the potential to be replicated in other districts.
- To establish a more suitable policy environment for pulses in the state, a consortium of organisations, a community of practice, for policy and lobbying is being formed.

KEY ACTIVITES:

- To encourage the adoption and improvement of contextually tailored packages of practices for a variety of enhanced pulse crops, taking into account the season and other relevant criteria such as soil condition.
- The formation of farmers' groups, the development of pulses demo plots, the promotion of solar irrigation systems, and a well-designed

package of training and extension activities such as pre-sowing training on specific crops' PoP, village level meetings, on-site assistance, pest and disease management training, post-harvest management capacity building, exposure visits, inter-village exposures visits, and capacitation visits.

- Enhancing the simplicity technique that grades corn, wheat, and pulses to make sure the quality is uniform and high-quality waste products.
- Exploring export markets for pulses.
- · Creating a shorting system machine for grading
- · Creating strong direct-to-customer marketing chains throughout the organisation.
- · In this fiscal year, develop micro-units for pulse processing and production.
- · Create the selling points.
- · Crop Museum for Green Gram crops.
- · Demonstration of Integrated pest managements.
- · Protection of wild animals.
- · Uses of Small farms equipment in Pulse Cultivation.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Saran via FPC 415 Farmers, 491.5 Kg. Moong Seed, 35.33 acre of covered area and other sources There are 12 farmers in all. a total of 18.1 kilogrammes of moong seed A total of 1.4 acres were sprayed. There were 426 farmers in all, with a combined total of 509.7 kilogrammes of moong seed and a covered area of 36.73 acres.
- Siwan through FPC 306 Farmers, 563.5 Kg. Moong Seed, and other sources covered an area of 41.73 acre the 18 agriculturists Seeds for 24 kilos of moong. A total of 1.76 acres were covered. There were 324 farmers in total, with 587.5 kilogrammes of moong seed and 43.51 acres of land covered in total.
- · Additionally, in both working village districts, totalling 69 pigeon pea demo farmers and 1 urad demo farmer, different themes have also been promoted.
- Under the canopy of the Project, it is more significant to reinforce and scale up the pulses cultivation in Bihar. Hence, to ensure the adoption of the standard Package of Practices of pulses crops, ascertaining of the most effective and efficient way for prevention of wild animals, demonstration of the integrated pest management approach for environment-friendly and cost-effective method and many other improved methods like high yielding varieties of seeds.
- · Solar based means of irrigation are cost-effective, very efficient, ecofriendly and user-friendly. It will revolutionise the irrigation segment.
- · Solar based irrigation, the project has supported for two new irrigation system one of Manjhi block of Saran District and one of

Raghunathpur block of Siwan district. This will be benefited 68 farmers and their 25 acres of land in Saran district and 106 farmers and their 27-acre land will be irrigated in Siwan district.

#5 Child Protection and Participation

PROJECT LOCATION: Saran

DONORS : Plan International



OUR OBJECTIVES:

- To establish Community Based Child Protection Mechanisms, linked to mainstream system which engages children, family and Community to ensure response to child protection issues becomes everyone's responsibility
- To educate and capacitate the peer educators for strengthening the CBCPM
- To capacitate the children and youths on communication skill through comics and theatre training
- To Improved capacity building of duty bearers and sensitized them on CP issues.
- To keep children engaged meaningfully in regular reading a variety of texts, stories and illustrations while in their classrooms and beyond.

KEY ACTIVITES:

- Strengthening govt. Structure, supporting institutional care, RMNCH+ programmers, through advocacy.
- · Program to promote behaviour change through different capacity building, sensitizing and proving services.
- · Awareness and campaign engaging women, adolescents, children, youths and stakeholders and other govt. Officials.
- Child survival, growth and optimal development.
- · Celebration of Adolescents Health Day.
- · Child protection and participation.
- · Disaster risk reduction and response.

 - -Refresher training of ANM, ASHA and AWW.
 -Training of youths / adolescents / peers Educator on SRH.
 - Sectoral Meeting with ANM/ASHA, AWW & frontline workers.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

Improved access to high-quality reproductive, maternity, child, and

- adolescent health care that benefit mothers and adolescent girls, particularly those from vulnerable and excluded groups, is supported directly and indirectly through lobbying and policy influence.
- Through a general health check-up (Anemia screening) and referral to counselling and clinical treatment, 2166 teenage girls were directly benefited, with an indirect reach of 11,500 girls in Parsa and Maker Block.
- ANC, immunisation, growth tracking, sanitation and hygiene directly benefited 2488 women, 583 adolescents, and 613 community members.
- · Under the Rashtriya Kishore Swasthya Karyakarm's implementation guidelines, 2166 adolescent girls were directly benefited (RKSK).
- · A total of 70 AHD units were hosted at AWCs, where Haemoglobin testing was performed, as well as additional counselling and referral to nearby Health Centres for severe cases.
- The use of Sanitary Napkins, IFA, Albendazole tablets, anti-spasmodic tablets, and contraceptives was encouraged and provided. Additionally, people were registered and had their health examined, including anaemia screening for teenage girls and referrals to AFHCs (where they could receive psychological assistance as well as clinical services).
- · 2156 women, including pregnant, nursing, and teenage women, were sensitised after the Breastfeeding Week.
- · Babies who are exclusively breastfed for six months had fewer ear infections, respiratory illnesses, diarrhoea, and other problems.
- By demonstrating how to utilise, prepare, and how much food to take from the nearby materials in Live Sessions, adolescents were sensitised directly benefiting 607 mothers and 107 staff from ICDS.
- A kitchen garden serves numerous purposes. A kitchen garden provides an easy, reliable, and convenient source of fresh veggies, which are essential for good health. Green veggies are packed with vitamins and minerals that help keep us healthy. 6000 families got the health benefits.
- 146 executive members from 10 schools have received democratic structure training, where all students have the right to equal opportunity, no discrimination, access to all facilities and education.
- To pilot a Digital Learning project that aligns with the government's education system and improves possibilities for high-quality learning while reducing gender inequalities for students from poorer communities.
- · Swachhata Sabha for School Girls (MHM) educated 1800 girls from 40 schools on important health issues such as menstrual health management.
- They work to promote adolescent girls' access to and usage of sanitary napkins, as well as to guarantee that sanitary napkins are properly disposed of in an environmentally responsible manner.
- · After being sensitised through a week-long session on Global Handwashing Day, 395 youngsters changed their behaviour and adopted new practises.

#6 Support to victims of flood affected family to sustain their lives in future.

PROJECT LOCATION: SITAMRHI

DONORS : Save the Children

OUR OBJECTIVES: Support for flood victims and their families in order to ensure their survival in the future.

KEY ACTIVITES:

Flood-affected beneficiaries are identified by a Household Survey. Establishing the distribution place and timing for relief goods.

Set up four counters: A. Welcome; B. Registration; C. Display; D. Material distribution at the distribution location.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

In front of PRI members, 450 shelter and hygiene kits, as well as food resources, were distributed.

Relief distribution went off without a hitch on the 13th, 14th, and 15th of March. During the COVID-19 lock-down, beneficiaries were pleased to receive a salter kit, mask, sanitizers, and hygiene kits.

Report on Health Camp Programs Organized by Nav Jagriti with the Support from Sitaram Jindal Foundation & Jindal Aluminum Introduction:-

With the financial support from Sitaram Jindal Foundation, Navjagriti organized _health camps with 57 beggars of Sewa kutir in the Patna district of Bihar.

Sewa Kutir is the Beggars rehabilitation home for male beggars run by Navjagriti with the support of social welfare dept. state govt. Of Bihar. Sewa kutir implementation of protection of beggars' rights ,for ensuring their rights we have been providing them with a preventive and protective environmental and committed to generate entrepreneurship skill among them .so far, we have rehabilitated around 324 beneficiaries into their family and linked with livelihood more than 80 beneficiaries on small scale business out of 969 registered beneficiaries in the last eight years .

Objective of the Health Camp:-

To provide free high-quality medical services and health related awareness to the poor and needy person .

Activities:-

we organized health camp on 26 July 2019 with all 57 beggars in the sewa kutir and we do the general health checkup and distribution of medicines.



Case Study-1 Vijay Singh at Sewa Kutir

Vijay Singh, a wonderful example of a Sewakutir, was forced to beg. Worms devoured 90% of the head as a result of the condition. Life would be over if therapy were to be postponed even for a single day. Saksham learned about the beneficiary via Mr Pankaj Sinha, a Lockley employee. The Superintendent of Sewakutir was alerted by Mr Shabhunath Singh, Saksham's Program Manager, that a beneficiary will be taken in from Kankarbag, which is close to Jagdish Hospital.





Mr Amresh Kumar (Home-Superintendent) directed ivir ivianendra Kumar (Field Coordinator), Miss Anupma Kumari (Counselor), Anand Purnima (ANM), and Shankar Ram to save Kankarbag's beneficiary (Care Taker). They'd all vanished in the direction of the recipient's lodging. They brought him here after rescuing him from Kankarbag. Mr Amresh Kumar (Home-Superintendent) took action at Sewakutir to clean and cline the beneficiary's body as a result of his worsening condition. A worm fell into his hair when he was shaving his head, and the worm ate 90 percent of his hair. On April 29, 2019, Sewakutir admitted him to PMCH on April 29, 2019, after rescuing and washing him. His admittance to the emergency room swayed the other patient. Vijay Singh was in extreme pain.

Nothing was done by the doctor or nurse to assist the patient in being admitted. Saksham was informed and asked to assist with medical care, according to Sewakutir's superintendent. Mr Abhinash Kumar, State Program Manager, and Miss Ratna Agrwal, District Manager, came to PMCH to speak with the hospital's

superintendent about Vijay Singh's situation. They informed them about the Mukhyamantri bhiksha vriti Niwaran Yojna, which is operated by the Social Welfare Department of the Bihar government. The patient was admitted to the emergency department and treatment began after a conversation with medical

personnel.



Sewakutir personnel work as caretakers at all hours of the day and night. The Superintendent visits the hospital on a regular basis and collaborates with doctors and medical staff to improve patient care.

The patient was finally discharged from PMCH on May 8, 2018. Sewakutir is always taking care of that patient and clothing him at PMCH every day. Dr. N.P.

We discovered about Dr. N.P. Narayan's plastic surgery after a recipient's wounds had healed from his stay with him. Suresh Kumar and Anand Purnima (ANM) of Sewakutir are always looking for his clothing toss PMCH patna Miss Anand Purnima (ANM).

The counselling programme at Sewakutir was in full flow. In counselling, the recipient repeatedly states that he is from Karbigahiya-3, Patna. The photo and address were given to the Jakhanpur Police Station in order to hunt for their own family.

When they recovered from their illness, we tracked down their home, and we'd like to see if we can reunite him with his family. During counselling, he wrote a piece in which he conveyed their feelings. The note, which you'll find enclosed, was written by the recipient.

After their residence was identified on November 1st, 2019, sewakutir learned more about their family. Let Vidyapati Singh, the father, was a magistrate in Patan, while his older brother is a lawyer at the Patna High Court.

On November 14th, 2019, Vijay Singh made contact with his family at the Saksham office. All members of the saksham team are there, including director

Mr Rajkumar.

Mrs. Manori Devi is a housewife and a highly hardworking woman who lives in Barahkurva Gram Panchayat. Mr. Kailu Sardar, her husband, is likewise literate and works in Bihar's neighboring state. She's become a member of the Mahila Mandal. She works with a team in their communities, and they actively participate in meetings, seminars, workshops, and other village or block-level events.

She is a very creative woman, and she stated that she was unaware of the group before joining it. She has little understanding of skill development and is unaware of her rights and entitlements. She was part in the process of block lobbying before joining the mahila mandal organization. She attends every gramme sabha and local community meeting on a regular basis, according to women's rights. She claimed that when I was not a member of the group, I never left the house. Prior to joining the company, I was completely reliant on a trusted senior figure. I'm now leaving the house to attend meetings, training, and other organisational events.

She has encouraged herself and decided to teach swing as part of the gender equality and women empowerment initiative. She has had private tailoring training. She works as a seamstress and relies on her earnings to meet the family's basic needs. Mrs. Manori Devi continues to attend all meetings and maintains her membership in the Mahila Mandal. She told the women that through this forum, they have gained awareness and empowerment, and that we are discussing gender, equality, and improvement. Women will not receive their rights and entitlements until they raise their voices for their rights as long as they are unaware. I am grateful to Nav Jagriti, a volunteer organization that works on women's issues. Nav Jagriti continues to keep us informed on our rights, government initiatives and policies, skill development, and women's empowerment. Thank you once more, Nav Jagriti. I'd want to ask the Nav Jagriti team to keep organizing awareness and rights-based programs in the same manner.



I am regularly involving in every group's members meeting and community level meetings. She said that her team youth groups are continue volunteering to provide the schooling to the poorest students through the youth group munch. The children who were away from school, she motivated the children to go to school. As the result, most of the children of Sapna's Village are going to school today.

Sapna Kumari enjoys teaching and is committed to continuing to educate and raise awareness among children. She's doing a fantastic job. If each town has a sapna, then our next generation's future is truly bright and beautiful.
