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
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Secretary's Statement

Our Story

In 1991, a group of youths from Parsa block started their struggle against flood and waterlogging. This group formed the "Jal Jamao Virodhee Sangharsh Committee" (An informal Committee for guidance and support against Water Logging) in Saran District. Later, this group formed Nav Jagriti (NJ) and got it registered under the Indian Societies Registration Act in 1993. Since then, the organization has been expanding through mergers and collaborations. We have emerged as one of the pioneer developmental organizations in Bihar. Our work is in sync with the Sustainable Development Goals:

Mission We endeavor to reduce inequality, empower women and communities and ensure quality education. Our focus is on child rights and health. Our key thematic areas also include disaster relief and livelihood generation for the marginalized communities.

Our Journey

Our journey of 29 years has been a roller-coaster ride, with ups and downs and a lot of learning. We haven't missed any chance to serve the community. Starting from Flood and disaster management to child rights, livelihood, agriculture, and waste management, our Impact has been significant in Bihar. Here's how and when we took one step further towards developing Bihar.

1991-2001 Nav Jagriti got registered as a formal organization under the Society Registration Act, 1860. For the first ten years, its focus was to manage flood disasters and ensure child rights, gender mainstreaming and women empowerment.

2002-2007 Health and Alternative energy and Livelihood and Mushar Community became important to focus points for the organization. Also constructed a hospital in Parsa, Saran which was named Nav Jagriti Sewa Sadan.

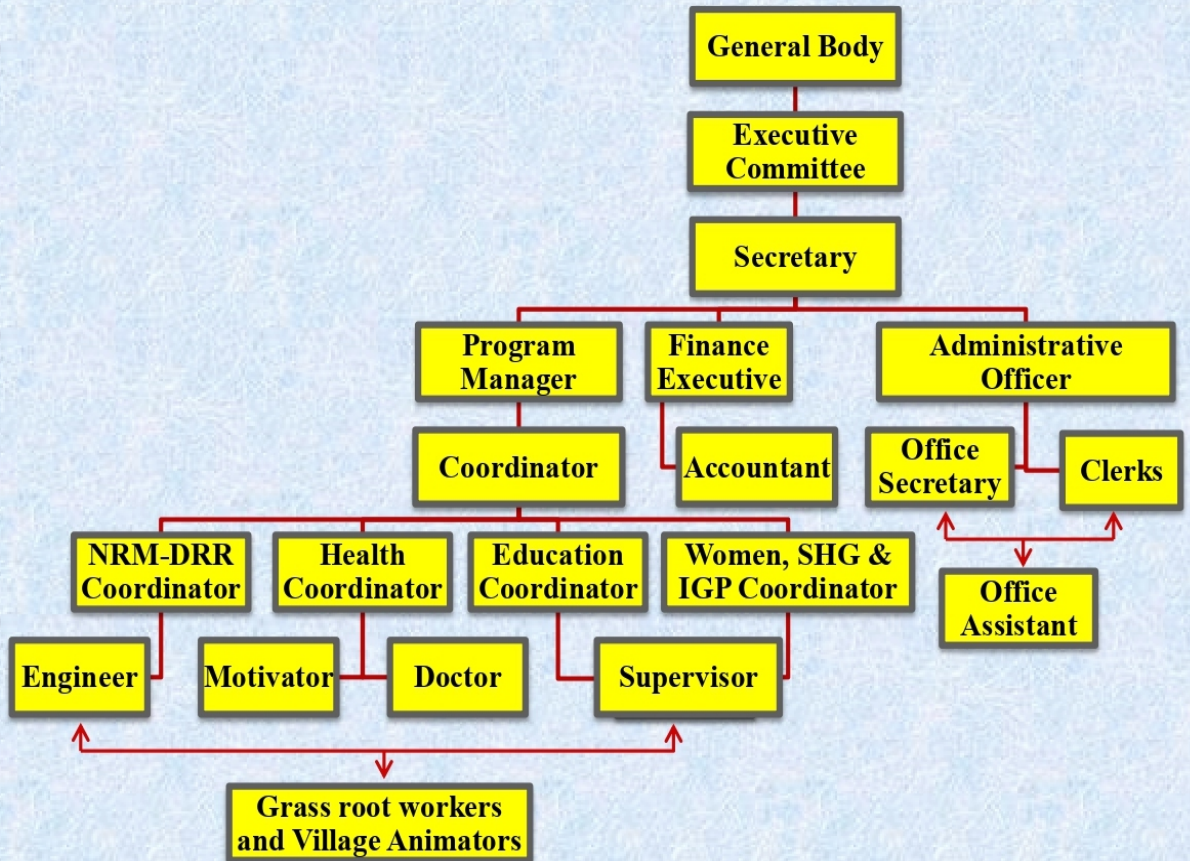
2008 - 2013 Child Protection and Child Rights has always been our focus but in this period, we got an opportunity to formally initiate the "Tara Akshar program with women SHG Members, convergence with Govt. in providing school uniforms and bicycles to promote girl education. NFE program of Govt. of India. (700 SHG formed)

2014 -2019 Started a Rehabilitation Centre for male beggars and took a step further to work in Agriculture and Livelihood. Urban Slum Initiative on the issues of WASH. Flood early warning system was also an important initiative in this period.

2020-2022 Now that we were already doing our bit for the cause of Child Rights, Women Empowerment, Agriculture, Livelihood, Health, and Rehabilitation Centres, it was important to understand Waste management is the need for the city of Patna. We started working with the ragpickers and started a Material Recovery Facility Center.

In the next five years, our focus would be on Child rights, Livelihood, and Urban Slum Development

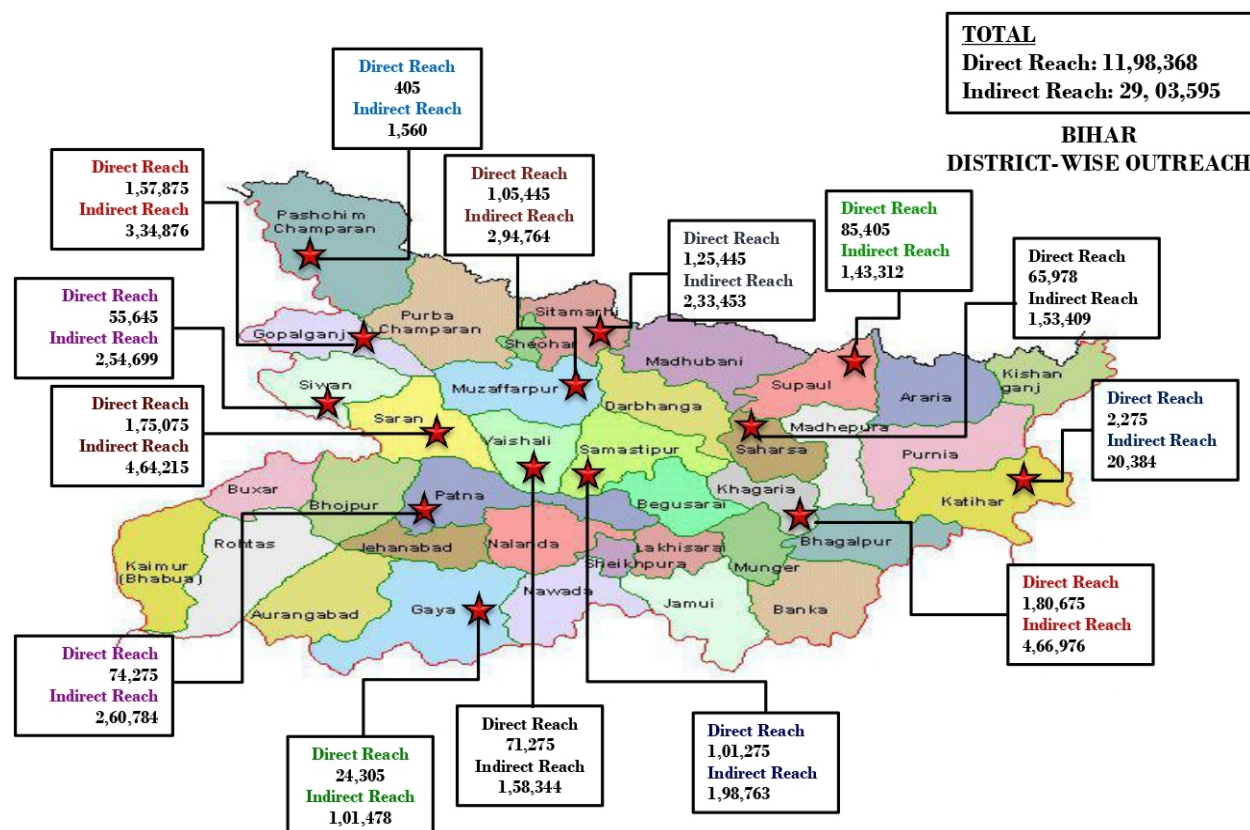

Highlights of the year

This year we mark our 29th year of establishment. We are very happy to announce that we have now taken a step ahead in our Intervention areas. By Indulging ourselves in Plastic Waste Management, we have taken a step further in Disaster and Climate Change. In the current scenario, the definition of disaster includes pandemic and climate change.

Our team with the support of individual and institutional donors have stood firm for flood victims and Covid 19 affected people, We distributed dry ration kits, medicines, and other instruments like oxygen cylinder, oximeter, and Flow meters (the essentials needed for Covid patients).

At Nav Jagriti, we understand that the Global issue of climate change needs to be solved at local levels. By initiating projects like plastic waste management and organic farming, we are not only creating livelihood but are also helping mitigate climate change.

This year we have worked in agriculture and promoted organic and natural ways of farming that not only help save the soil but is also helping in water conservation. Our Plastic Waste Management intervention is an initiative to deal with the undamaged dry waste which is creating havoc in the city. The intervention's aim is also towards helping the rag pickers community by directly purchasing their collection and removing the middlemen.

In the coming years, primarily our focus would be on Health, Child rights, Urban slum development, and Livelihood generation. Our hidden agenda would continue to be on Climate Change and Natural Disasters affecting normal people.

01. Community Empowerment through Integrated Development Interventions

“Parivartan”

Small and marginal farmers don't have sufficient 'voice' and lack collective bargaining power to improve their access to credit, better inputs, and public services. They can't invest in higher quality Inputs due to poor access to credit facilities. Frequent droughts in the district have worsened the problem and made farming a risky livelihood for farmers. The extension facilities are not customized for small holders as they are used to go for traditional farming systems. We tend to intervene in the selected area because it has very low

ratings on all the basic development indices. The majority of the disadvantaged population living here faces very basic issues related to hygiene and sanitation, quality of education, lack of basic infrastructure with the government agencies in order to administer several development programs of the Government, and overall lack of awareness among the targeted community. This area has historically been low on

various social indices and huge disparities could be seen in the socio-economic conditions of the existing communities. To falsify the concept of "Poverty is a quagmire" and bridge these societal differences which are increasing day by day. there are several issues on which we need to address and work with this community and many of them can be covered by following the tried and tested Multiple Input Area approach of Nav Jagriti within our limits and constraints.



Community Empowerment through Integrated Development Interventions



The goals of the project are as follows: -
To increase the household income for poverty reduction.-To raise the quality of life of the villagers through communities. To ensure environmental up gradation through plantation, soil, and water conservation.

Community participation played a major role in smooth implementation of this project. Now after completion of one year we are confident that community will take ownership and accountability of the work done in their respective villages for progress and growth of the community. The infrastructure development in schools and community for agriculture has been very impactful in helping Belaganj, one of the most undeveloped districts of Bihar.

The project has been very impactful among women, farmers, adolescent girls, school children, and individual households. In the support of Farmers, women, and the village community we have provided pulse seed support (60 farmers), guided in kitchen and sack gardening (500 units), created toolkit banks in the villages (5), promoted vegetable cultivation in 90 acres of land (600 units), installed solar based group irrigation system and constructed vermi compost pits (30) For the betterment of schools, infrastructure renovation has been done and Smart Classes have been started in Panari and Baraini. Renovation and beautification of infrastructures specially sanitation facilities and Anganwadi centers have helped lactating mothers.



Diversity in a plate

Asha Devi lives in Simra village, Belaganj block of Gaya district in Bihar. her family relies mostly on farming for their diets and livelihood. earlier she used to work very hard on her farm but her diet hardly included any vegetables. she wishes to feed her family well and keeps thinking about her family's health. In a family of six, it was becoming difficult every day to buy enough vegetables from the market.



HRDP's key intervention distributed seeds through the promotion of IVC along with a kitchen garden in the Kisan club and helped create vegetable farming near the hand pump. With this initiative, the wastewater from the hand pump could be utilized in growing vegetables. This small step created a huge impact for families like Asha's, and reduced reliance on the market for vegetables.

The project has supported her with different vegetable seeds and vermi compost for 2 Kattha of land. She is cultivating several seeds in her field & has also been trained for improved vegetable cultivation and significance for sustainable livelihoods. Asha Devi proudly claims that the foods grown in the garden were being utilized in recipes within their home. Additionally, she said the quantity was more than sufficient for the foods to be distributed to the whole family.

Asha Devi's garden is placed next to the area where the family washes dishes. In addition to the wastewater, there is also a bore well which helps maintain the kitchen garden. Asha Devi noted that electricity can be unreliable in her village. Since the garden can be maintained with waste water, it doesn't require intense irrigation and can easily be maintained with the wastewater and groundwater.

02. Inclusive Development through Building & Sustainable Communities Livelihood Bihar Building-Sustainable

“Building Sustainable Communities”

Supported by Bread for the world, this was a short-term project of six months. The objective of this project was to strengthen marginalized communities to empower them with the help of advocacy and agriculture for economic and social change. The promotion of active participation of women to implement government schemes was its sub-objective.

In this project, we have given seed support to more than 100 farmers and trained some 550 farmers on organic farming techniques.



CAPACITY BUILDING WITH TRAININGS AND SOCIAL SECURITY SCHEMES



Mixed farming, low water cultivation, multi-cropping, and the use of organic manure were promoted with the help of outreach and training. proper benefits of PDS and social security schemes were also ensured during the project term. A total number of 2870 families get the benefits of the social security scheme and public distribution system and 69 Applications for PDS(New Ration Card) & 219 new card documents were submitted.

Anita's First Kitchen Garden

Anita Devi lives in Pratapur village in Triveniganj block of Supaul. She has six members in her family. she works hard on her farm but the only food that she could offer her family was grains that grew on her farmland and some very basic vegetables like brinjal and cabbage. Relying on the market for other vegetables was very costly and Anita could not afford that. So, when the distribution of seeds and training on farming techniques started in her village, she became hopeful and felt that she must also take part in the training. The promotion of kitchen gardens and using the area around hand pumps for vegetable gardening started in the Kisan clubs. The purpose of these small farms was to create dietary diversity in the community and reduce the reliance on the market for vegetables. Anita also did



the same at her house and admits that vegetable farming has been impact ful for her family and her village. Her garden now includes pumpkin, tori, chili, Brinjal green leaf, and tomatoes. Apart from the project Anita Devi and all participants are encouraged to exchange seeds with other households to increase food diversity within the whole village. Seed exchange and proper maintenance of vegetable farming will allow this intervention to be self-sustained for the future.

03. New Zindgi

“A New Way for Life”

The overall objective of the project is to abolish child labour, trafficking and prostitution safeguarding the rights of children of Garkha, Parsa and Maker blocks of Saran district.

It's sub objectives include increasing awareness and sensitization among all stakeholders on the issues of child trafficking, child labour, child rights and it's protection.

Adolescence is the transitional phase of physical and psychological development. It is when a child's personality takes up its shape. It is a time when children are not sure of what is going on around them. Munna Munni Manch (MMM) is an initiative that gives a direction to these individuals. It is a space where adolescents come together and understand their rights and responsibilities. Munna Munni Manch's critical function is to spread awareness on the harmful effects of child marriage and child trafficking.



It gives us immense pleasure/satisfaction to announce that our Munna Munni Manch groups together have been able to stop 13 child marriage cases and one child trafficking case in the villages of Bihar.

A total of 150 children have been actively associated with 11 Munna Munni Manch in project villages and 25 youth from Nayi Zindagi Adolescent groups have been developed as resource persons as they have started facilitating training and meeting of child club and child protection committees.

Hope in a Basket

Forty-year-old Rashmi, from Garkha village, Saran (Bihar), had never thought such a change of events would occur in her life. In a family of four, Rashmi's elder son was the only earning member of the family. He is a daily wage laborer and hardly earns enough. Rashmi's husband had died when she



was younger. She has three children two daughters and a son. The family was living in extreme poverty. Farming was also not an option as they did not own any land. Rashmi used to work on other people's farms to earn some money. Even though she was working very hard, it was becoming increasingly difficult to survive.

This was the time when Nav Jagriti with support of KNH had started its skill development programs at various places in the project area. The training of basket-making started in different villages of Bihar. In Garkha village also, they went with the concept of making Baskets with Bamboo. Initiated in the pre-historic age, the bamboo art in Bihar has unique features that carry intrinsic beauty and great creativeness. We realized this traditional art is going extinct with the fast-paced generation. Bringing back the culture of creativity and sustainability was one of the themes of this skill development program by Nav Jagriti.

Hope in a Basket

Rashmi got to know about this in one of the awareness programs by the volunteers/staff of Nav Jagriti. The training program included making raw material from bamboo to finally giving it a shape of a basket. Rashmi got interested in making baskets, and she also realized that her fingers were good at it. She learned the skill well, and now she makes baskets on her own and sells them in the market. On a normal day, she makes 2-3 baskets; with each basket, she earns around 80-90 rupees. Rashmi said now she is making a living out of it, and she is able to feed her family well. Rashmi is a role model for the women of Meethepur Garkha village. Not only has she the guts to learn something new at the age of forty, but she also has the perseverance to start something new from scratch all over again.

Rashmi has brought back the art of basket making from bamboo in the village. In the age of readily available plastic baskets, Rashmi's sustainable business is also being supported by environmentally conscious people.



04. Plastic Waste Management

“Urban Planning and Resilient Cities”

The Project aims to minimize the impacts and risks to the environment and to human health by enhancing sustainable Plastic Waste Management practices, through socio-technological model (segregation/ collection/recycling) while ensuring compliance with regulations, to improve use of resources and in line with Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM) in India.



A group of 500 Safai Sathis (supplier of plastic waste to MRFC) is formed and are assisted for enrollment in making Aadhar Cards, enrollment in Govt. health insurance schemes, Govt, livelihood schemes linked with Banks for savings through formation of their SHGS.

One Material Recovery Facility Centre (MRFC) is functional, collecting and processing 360 tons of plastic waste per quarter and reducing approximately 144 Kgs carbon emissions (1 Kg carbon released on burning of 2.5 Kgs of plastic) in Patna City.

A Ragpicker-a role Model-Babita



Babita Devi was a ragpicker in the Gardanibagh area, Safal Sathi as we call them.. Her's was not a simple life, she used to be on the roads for the whole day and because of so many middlemen, she could not earn a proper living as well. her husband used to work for some agency but he had also lost his job. When the MRF center started, she started coming to the center with her collect every day, she could see the difference in her daily earnings. the MRF center's sub- objective is to empower the ragpicker's comminutes. when Babita started coming daily, we offered her a job at the MRF center. It was very brave of Babita also to take this step of handling the machines at the MRF center. she was not afraid to handle the electric machinery the hard and soft plastic shredders. She performed really well.

Babita became a very good example of a woman who has now achieved a sustainable livelihood with the help of the MRF center. She has three children and now all of them are going to school. On 25th January, Babita participated in a meeting organized by UNDP. The meeting had renowned dignitaries of Niti Ayog and Babita was quite vocal in front of them. she received a lot of appreciation for her boldness and attitude towards life. Babita later received the Women Achiever's Award from Mrs. Renu Devi, Deputy Chief Minister Bihar. Babita is a role model for all women of not only in her community but for the whole state. Now she earns a monthly income from the MRF center and sends her children to school. Her husband also works on a part-time basis at different places wherever he finds a place to work.

05. Sewa Kutir (MBNY)

“Home for the homeless”

Sewa Kutir, a rehabilitation home for beggars is a project running under State society for Ultra poor and Social Welfare, government of Bihar, to protect and promote the rights of poor and beggars by ensuring their care protection and socio-economic empowerment. The purpose of this home is to provide a decent stay for these people until they get rehabilitated.



Presently there are 46 beggars who are staying in Sewa Kutir. Last year, 64 beggars got registered in Sewa Kutir, out of which 48 have been rehabilitated. 25 men have met their families and 23 have chosen to work somewhere and earn a living by themselves. People have been given livelihood opportunities with the help of the organization. All the beneficiaries at Sewa Kutir have been vaccinated in the camp by health department, Patna, Bihar.

SEWAKUTIR AND MENTAL HEALTH

Sewa Kutir is a rehabilitation Center, here we receive multiple cases where the person is mentally unwell and has either left home by mistake, got lost, and sometimes some families also abandon them. eventually they end up begging on roads. Mental health is a stigma in our society, the patient needs special care and proper medication. At our center in Patna we have dealt with many a such cases. Last year also, we have received approximately 40 cases of Mental health patients. Sewa Kutir is infra structurally organized to deal with mental health patients. With the help of trained councillors and specialized doctors we have been successful in rescuing such cases and rehabilitating them back to their homes.



Amit's Journey back home

Life sometimes becomes so harsh for people with mental illness. And in a place like Bihar, having a mental health disorder is perceived with a sense of judgement and there is stigma associated with those having mental health issues. People call them lunatics and sometimes hurdle stones on them. On 27th June, 2021, we received a case from Janipur police station. It was surprising for us also as he started dancing when he reached Sewa Kutir. His gesture and a letter received from



the police station made it clear that Amit was mentally unwell and needed special care. We helped him bathe and clean up, however he refused to wear new clothes and he continued to be very anxious and very active at the center. With the help of a specialized doctor, we gave him medicines which helped him calm down and he could finally sleep a bit. The next day, the councillors spent some time with him and they got to know that his name was Amit. But this was the only information they could extract from him that day. But after that day Amit started living in Sewa Kutir peacefully, he also followed the routine and ate with other members without disturbing anybody. It was nice to see him like this all settled but still we were worried about his family. The councillors spent time with him regularly and after three days, on 1st of July, he started talking about his family and shared a phone number with us.

Amit is a resident of Sabaya village, Maharanaganj, Uttar Pradesh. We called on the number and his father, Rajendra Yadav, received the call. Ohh what a relief!

The father was relieved and explained that Amit has some mental issues and he needs proper care and medication. He had missed his medicines and he has been missing for some 15 days. He was very happy that his son was in good hands. Rajendra came to Patna on 3rd July and after all the paperwork and procedures he could take his son back home. Although Amit was here for just five days but he became so close to us. We were both very happy that he could meet his family and sad that he was going back. Cases like Amit are many but very few actually reach back their families. It is only with the efforts of organizations like these and a combined effort of police and government that we are able to rehabilitate such people.

06. Work-No Child Business

“Preserving Bachpan”

The project aims to reduce the child labour In 20 villages of Mansi block of Khagaria and 10 villages of Aural block of Muzaffarpur district. Despite the pandemic COVID-19, the project has been an impactful one. Last year 95 out of school going or drop out children have been enrolled in government



schools, 37 child labour have been made free from work. The parents are involved in income generation programs based on backward and forward linkages as result of which, the migration due to push force has been reduced. 30 Adolescent groups of boys and girls are actively working to address the issues of child labour.

The project is aimed at protecting the child and safeguarding their interest by reducing child labour. The intervention has empowered marginalized groups who were trapped in the vicious circle of poverty and societal norms, now they are raising their concerns before the panachayat representatives and government to address their issues. The women have been linked with the Bihar rural Livelihood Support Project, through self-help groups. The team from BRLPS have regular meetings with these SHGS These groups are becoming instrumental in overcoming child labour.



Savita's Tomatos

Pandemic has caused so many livelihood losses all over the world. It is difficult to cope in such situations, especially in a large family like Savita's. she has three sons, Mayank Madhukar, Raja Kumar, and Mayuresh Kumar. Savita was facing livelihood issues, even though her husband was working in a private job, their earnings were not enough to support the education of her children.

Savita has some land of her own but she lacked capital and the skills for farming, so when Nav Jagriti was providing training on the organic ways of farming, she made sure she attended it. she could also receive seed support from the organization which helped



her initiate her vegetable cultivation. Last year, she planted tomatoes in one kattha of the plot, she made use of poly sheets on the farm. Last year, she earned a a total of Rs. 22000 from the tomato cultivation. This year also, she has planted tomatoes only on a bigger plot of two katthas, and she expects to have a return of Rs. 50000. This small initiative and seed support has helped Savita in getting their children back to their school.

07. Nav Jagriti's Sewa Sadan

“A Hospital for the needy”

Nav Jagriti's Sewa Sadan was initially started as a programme on Improving Community Health Services through Curative and Preventive Health Care in Flood and Water Logged Areas of Saran District of Bihar, India. It was started with the support from Misereor, Germany. Health was always Nav Jagriti's primary agendas. in this project also we did some very important awareness activities on sanitation, hygiene, menstrual health and different types of contraceptives. After a while, Misereor, Germany withdrew it's support from Sewa Sadan, but even till now, we continue to work in Sewa Sadan as a proper hospital that works as a multi speciality hospital we have some trained doctors and nurses appointed by our organization for the better suggestion.



Flood Relief



Bihar is a flood prone area, and much of Bihar's misery has been caused by the Kosi river, which is a major tributary of Ganges. the worst affected areas are Araria, Saharsa, Supaul and Madhepura.

Nav Jagriti's connection with flood is no history. The inspiration of Nav Jagriti came from floods in the district of Parsa. Nav Jagriti's journey also started when the youth of Parsa block saw and wanted to help their people during flood.

This year also with the support from different institutions, we have been able to spread awareness on safety and precautions during flood.



KNH's Flood Relief work

“Humanitarian Assistance to affected Children and their families under Nayi Zindgi (New Life) Project”

Flood affected villages (Kasba Maker of Maker block, Patti Mujauna of Parsa block and Garkha, Pirari Kadna, Mithepur, Sargatti, Majlispur, Motirajpur and Sadhpur of Garkha blocks of the Nayi Zindgi Project located in Saran (Chapra) district, Bihar were covered under the relief program. The estimated number of the direct target groups, with which the project has worked directly is about 1000 households/families from all the 10 villages. All the households associated with our ongoing project were selected with ultra-poor, marginalized, and scheduled caste and backward castes people in particular. That comprised of about 965 enrolled children, 282 SHG members of 21 SHGs who are female, CPC members, Adolescent groups etc. Out of the 965 children, 512 were boys and 453 were girls while all the SHG members were female. The basic objective was to provide humanitarian assistance in their need during the post-flood period so that they can return to their previous life standards and overcome the situation. It was intended to bring the following changes. The Sub-objectives are as follows-

1. To protect people from water-borne diseases and to regain their physical standards with immunity during post-flood period.
2. To keep the educational activities of the children when they are at home when the NFE Centers are not functional.
3. To improve the hygienic and sanitary conditions of the villages when the flood water has returned back
4. To protect the children, adolescents and women from their trafficking and protect the child rights in case of the emerging disaster.
5. To strengthen the people's Disaster Risks Reduction preparedness initiatives keeping in view the regular changes in Climatic conditions.

Covid-19 Response

Nav Jagriti has been a part of the COVID-19 emergency response from the very start. We acted fast, were flexible and open to learning, adopted a multi- sectoral approach and worked together for the people who were most affected by this pandemic.

Our objectives were twofold:

Pillar 1, Covid-19 response dealt with awareness building among community members on the importance of vaccines and guided them on making registrations and appointment for vaccines.

Under Pillar 2, Nav Jagriti's main focus was to Ensure continuity of essentials like ration kits and life-saving medicines and medical equipment like oxygen cylinders, flow meters, oximeter etc. focusing on the most vulnerable communities.

Nav Jagriti's COVID-19 response would not have been possible without the support of several institutions as well as individual donors who contributed resources of various kinds including generous financial support. Nav Jagriti expresses its sincere gratitude to the its donors and partners.

■ The migration rate in Bihar is exceptionally high. The vast majority of migration in Bihar is cyclical labour migration by vulnerable groups. People migrate from their villages to cities in search of jobs and better living conditions. However, in COVID times, these migrants severely got affected.



They are mostly daily wage earners or work part-time for some shops, houses, etc. They earn so less that they never have enough to save for the future. There were no jobs available for these people. No wonder they were starving and were hoping for something good to happen. SEEDS came to help in that situation to this vulnerable set of the population in Patna. Nav Jagriti, with the help of SEEDS, organized a ration distribution camp in Patna.

The ration kit included rice, wheat(aata), pulses (dal) mustard oil, salt sugar, phenyl and mask.

Vulnerable communities who need COVID-19 vaccines the most, are being left behind in getting vaccinated and are falling through the cracks in current vaccination drives. There have been mixed responses to the vaccines by the people of Bihar. One part of the population is restraining themselves from taking vaccines, and the other section of the population, the poor and the marginalized sections of the society who want to take the vaccine or have taken their first doses. But they have been facing difficulty in their online registration for various reasons or reaching the vaccination camps. Nav Jagriti, the team with the support of Bread for the World, has worked in the Supaul district of Bihar for spreading awareness on precautions against covid-19 and the benefits of the vaccination Debunking the myths against Vaccination Guiding people in booking for online vaccination, registration of their phone numbers vaccination updates, and final vaccination of both doses for covid-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in health, social and economic emergencies during the second wave, in India Bihar was one of the worst affected states in India. Over 2 lakh residents of Bela block in Gaya district have also faced social, economic, and health problems due to Covid-19. Similarly



community intervention villages of the HRDP project in Gaya, Bihar have also faced similar problems as they are dependent on vending, agriculture, daily wage, and migrant earnings. In the intervention villages due to Lockdown and travel restrictions vendors, small/landless farmers, vendors, Dalit and mahadalit, agricultural wage



labor, daily wages, and migrant are facing social, economic, and health crises. Nav Jagrit with support from HDFC Bank limited distributed dry rations in the intervention area. Altogether 280 families have benefitted from the distribution of dry rations.

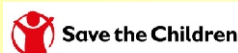


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
